

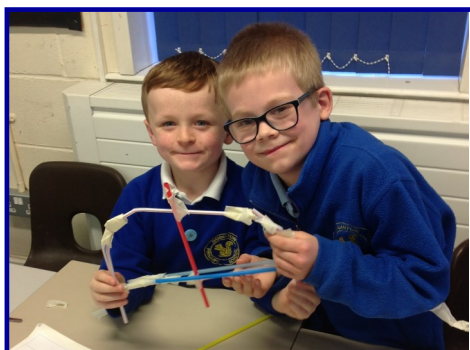
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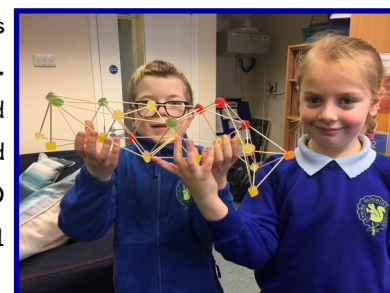
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## Message from Miss Talbot

Dear Parents,

One of the things I enjoy most about my role in school is sharing the children's special achievements with them. Already this week I have had 18 children visit my office with a 'gold card' and I am sure that similar numbers have found their way to Miss Collins or Mrs Stein. Children receive a gold card when they have done something amazing—this is as diverse as a wonderful piece of written work, a stunning piece of art or showing great understanding and application in maths. The children share their work with me and talk about what they have done. Without exception they are proud of their accomplishments and can't wait to share the good news with you. Today's visitors included Noah and Leo who had created an information book all about London and Jasmine and Andrew who had been exploring 3D structures by creating a bridge out of cocktail sticks and midget gems!



Celebrating the children's successes is an important part of our ethos at Godinton. Our weekly celebration assemblies continue to highlight individual achievement and those children who come to our weekly tea party having received our 'Star Award' enjoy talking about the things they are doing at school and what they get up to at the weekend. I have been educated in what happens at 'Flip Out' and which films are worth watching at the cinema. We want our children to be confident and well rounded individuals and we endeavour to give them an enriching educational experience that makes them excited about learning.

As the academic year progresses we have lots more exciting things to look forward to—we will be celebrating World Book Day in March and fund-raising for Sport Relief. We plan on concluding the year with celebrations for the school's 40th anniversary. I hope that these events will give the children further memorable experiences to enjoy.

## Safety

We are immensely fortunate to have a road crossing patrol operating in Loudon Way. Mrs Humphries valiantly stands out in all weathers, safely seeing children and parents across the road. Please can I encourage all parents and children to make use of this valuable service rather than crossing at unsafe points, particular the corner bend in Loudon Way. The designated crossing point provides the clearest point for getting across the road and we want to ensure that all our children arrive at school safely.

You may well have noticed the PCSO, Catherine Stevens, completing patrols in the area. Catherine is part of the Police force's neighbourhood policing team, supporting warranted officers and community action teams to solve local problems. We report any local concerns that we have to the PCSO. We are keen to develop greater links with Catherine and are hoping to invite her into a school assembly to talk to the children about her role next term.

## Safeguarding

Next week is Online Safety Week, an opportunity for the children to engage in activities promoting staying safe online. Tuesday 6th February is National E-safety day but throughout the week, the children will be reminded of the importance of staying safe online through age appropriate activities and given strategies to help them do this.

The online safety pages on the school website provide good guidance for parents in supporting their children with use of the internet at home. We will be sending out further information to parents about online safety in the next few days including the importance of setting filters on IT equipment (including smart phones and tablets) and managing social media usage with their children.

Miss Talbot is the school's Designated Safeguarding Lead and any concerns about child welfare should be brought to her attention.

## Class Assemblies

Thank you to all the parents who joined us for Bumblebee and Eagles class assemblies. I know that it means a lot to the children to have parents and grandparents come and watch.

## KS1 and KS2 SATs Information Meetings

At the start of term 4 we will be offering parents the opportunity to come along to KS1 and KS2 SATs information meetings. SATs are the statutory national tests which children undertake in May of Year 2 and Year 6. The children complete tests in reading, maths, grammar punctuation and spelling and their writing is assessed. We always aim to make the testing process as painless as we can for the children and ensure that they are prepared appropriately for the questions they will complete.

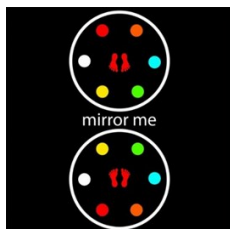
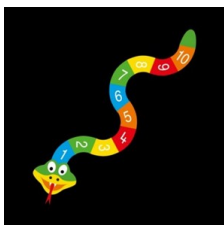

We are in the process of finalising dates with the Year 2 and Year 6 teams and will notify parents of these in due course.

## Mini Management Team



Our Mini Management Team have been working hard this term to gauge the interest of children in their class about how we can improve playtimes. Our PTFA have kindly agreed to fund the development of the playground to make it a more engaging and stimulating environment for the children. The classes have had lots of amazing ideas which have been shared with me.

Feedback from the children is that they would like to have some playground markings created, including games such as an adventure trail, 'copy me' dance markings, hopscotch and target activities. The MMT will be coming outside with me next week to measure the playground in order to make a final decision as to where these could best be installed and how they can best use the best budget set. The children have also said that they would like some new signs in the playground as well as benches and tables so this will form the second part of the project.



All our children are encouraged to share any ideas for school development with their Mini Management Representatives or to put them in the gold box outside Butterflies classroom. It's unlikely that we will be able to install a hot tub or roller coaster as requested but we can do something about issues raised such as improving the soap in the toilets.

As you can see, our MMT also now have their own logo, kindly designed by Mr Foss.

## Disabled Access

We have a number of disabled parents and children who require special assistance on the school site. Only parents accessing the nursery or those with a blue disabled badge are allowed access to the school car park. Please can I ask that all other parents refrain from coming into the school car park.

# Governor News

In order for parents to get to know more about our Governing Body, we will be including information from our Governors in each newsletter.



## Message from the Chair of Governors: Steve King

Through this and future articles we will introduce you to the members of the

Governing Body, outline the role we play in the management of the school and share with you our successes.

The Governing Body is made up of 11 governors supported by a clerk who is not a governor. Governors provide strategic management supporting the work of the headteacher and staff. The role is often said to be that of 'critical friend' whereby governors challenge the schools results and actions with the view to ensuring the best possible education for the children at Godinton Primary School.

Here at Godinton we are very fortunate that we have a strong senior leadership team supported by good and dedicated staff, which makes it easy to fulfil our role. We aim to work in partnership with the headteacher and staff to provide a fully rounded education for the children in our school, enabling them to reach their full potential. The governor team share their wide range of skills while working with the senior leadership team to ensure the smooth running and future successes of the school and we take pride in the schools many achievements.

The Governing Body is made up of different types of governor although their role is the same despite the different categorisation. Our Governing Body is made up of the Headteacher, 1 x Staff Governor, 3 x Parent Governors and 6 x Member Appointed Governors.

Member Appointed Governors are individuals appointed by the Academies Members (The Godinton Primary Academy has a panel of 3 members who, amongst other duties, have the

ability to appoint up to 6 governors to the Governing Body). The appointments are made from people in the community who express an interest in the education of children at Godinton Primary School and whose skills meet the needs of the role. We will explain more about the other types of governor in future articles as we begin to introduce you to the Governors.

## Getting to know our Governors

### Governor Profiles

#### Steve King (Chair of Governors)

Steve first became a governor at the school in January 2001 and has been Chair of Governors since May 2005 and is currently a Member Appointed Governor. Steve has provided the following detail about himself :

*I have recently retired having completed 40 years in the civil service, most recently working for the Home Office as a budget manager.*

*I was keen to become a governor at Godinton to enable me to put my skills to good use in support of the school in recognition of all they were doing for my children. By 2005 my children had left the school but its continued advances made me want to stay and share in its future successes. My experience in financial management, property management and health & safety assist me in my governor role and in leading the schools team of Governors.*

*As Chair of Governors I have a number of responsibilities in addition to the usual governor role including chairing meetings and taking the lead for health & safety. I also have joint lead responsibility for safeguarding and finance.*

*I am married with two grown up children who both attended the school and I have lived on the Godinton Park estate since 1988. My spare time activities include gardening, woodworking and, due to advancing years, long naps in front of the television.*

## Other News...

- Please could we ask that parents of children in Year R and Year 1 do not bring large school bags into school.
