Dear Parents,

It was a real pleasure to see all the exciting activities taking place in school earlier this month to celebrate World Book Day. Aside from fantastic dressing up costumes, one of the highlights was the opportunity that our Year 6 children were given, to read to our Reception children. The older children took picture books down into the younger classes and spent time sharing these stories with the children. Ofsted

Our anticipated Ofsted inspection took place on Tuesday. This was a one day inspection with just one inspector who spent a very busy day analysing school assessment and test results, looking at the auality of work in books, observing lessons and talking to staff, pupils and parents. The outcome of the inspection is confidential at this stage but will be available to parents at some point after Easter once the report has been produced and has been through the process of auality assurance. Peer Review

Last week, our school participated in a Peer Review which enabled us to review our school practices and standards through observation and dialogue with Headteachers and Deputy Headteachers from other local schools. This has been arranged through the Ashford Teaching Alliance and allows participating schools the opportunity to validate their own judgements on standards and to share good practice with local colleagues. We were joined for a day by Headteachers and Deputies from Lady Joanna Primary School in Wye, Bethersden Primary School and Goat Lees Primary School who watched lessons, looked at books, talked to staff and children and visited classrooms. We received very positive feedback from the visit including praise for the auality of work and progression evident in the children's books, the behaviour of the children and the positive atmosphere of the school, concluding that Godinton is a good school. I am very much looking forward to visiting our colleagues in their schools over the next few months and completing their Peer Reviews. We can always gain a lot by thinking outwardly and sharing good practice with others so have very much welcomed opportunity.

Staffing News

Mrs Reed has been a Midday Supervisor and a leader at Breakfast Club as well as helping out at numerous PTFA events over the years. Message from the Chair of Governors: Steve King

Governor Responsibilities under the Equality Act 2010

As I am sure you can imagine, legislation under the Equality Act 2010 has a large impact on school life, especially in ensuring every child has the same teaching and learning opportunities. As Governors, we are responsible for ensuring the school meets the requirements of the Act. We also have to ensure that, when we are making decisions or developing policies, we have due regard to eliminating conduct that is prohibited by the Act (i.e. Discrimination), ensuring equality of opportunity and fostering good relations.

As a school we have to pay particular attention to the outcomes of groups of learners covered by the Act, including children with disabilities and additional educational needs, children who are in care or for whom English is an additional language and many more with different characteristics. As part of the Governor role we have to consider the needs of all groups of learners and ensure that they have access to the same teaching and learning opportunities as those without the characteristics covered by the Act.

Some years ago we set up a working group, now known as the Equality Working Group, which includes Assistant Headteacher, Sarah Stein and Chair of Governors, Steve King supported by a selection of Governors and parents. The Group helps to meet some of the requirements of the Act with its main task being the creation and annual review of the schools Accessibility Plan. At a recent meeting the Group considered some Equality Objectives for the school which will be published on the Equality page on the school website in April. The Accessibility Plan and other equality information can be found on the school website.

With all the school has in place and the actions taken by our Governors I am confident that we fully meet the needs of the Act and therefore ensure that all our children are afforded the same opportunities.

Governor Recruitment

We currently have 3 'Member Appointed Governor' vacancies and would like to enlist your help in filling them. 'Member Appointed Governors' are individuals from the community, who are not related to children in the school but who have skills needed by the Governing Body.
