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### Message from Miss Talbot

Dear Parents,

This term we have started to trial offering some of our children a school packed lunch which is prepared in our kitchen by Independent Catering. This is something we have been considering for a while in response to suggestions from both parents and children. In the first instance this has only been offered out to children in Years R to 2. We felt that offering this to a trial group of children would enable us to iron out any teething problems, and would enable us to see the impact that this would have on the kitchen. When selecting their lunch choice during morning register, the children will either make a choice of hot meal or will select the option to have a school packed lunch and can have different options on different days of the week. The packed lunch consists of a roll (with the children being able to choose ham, cheese or tuna), a pudding and salad (including crudites and fruit) from the salad cart. The salad cart is available to all children who have either a hot or cold school lunch and includes items such as lettuce, tomatoes, cucumber, pasta salad, coleslaw, olives, pickled onions, and fruit. All children in Years R to 2 are entitled to a free school meal under the Government's Universal Free School Meal initiative. We hope that the addition of offering a packed lunch option will encourage more families to take advantage of this entitlement.

We will see how things go over the course of this term, and in partnership with Independent Catering, look at whether it is viable to offer the packed lunch option to all children in the school in the future, all year round or just in the summer months. All possibilities will be considered and any feedback from parents is always welcome.

The school is also in the process of developing a new policy to collate all our processes in the management of food allergies. This will be available on the school website at the start of term 6.

## Other News and Reminders...

### Safeguarding– Operation Encompass

Our school has signed up to a joint countywide operation between Kent Police and local schools, known as Operation Encompass. Operation Encompass has been set up to help schools provide support to children who have been present, exposed to or involved in any domestic abuse incident. These types of incident can cause significant physical or emotional harm and therefore consider it to be of the upmost importance to support children in these circumstances.

The school will receive a confidential email from Kent Police before 12 noon the morning after a child has been exposed to, or involved in any domestic abuse incident. As the Designated Safeguarding Lead at Godinton, I have received training which allows me to use the information shared, in confidence, while ensuring that the school is able to make provision for the right support to be available for any child and their family. We are always keen to offer the best support possible to all our pupils and we believe this initiative will be beneficial to all those involved.

Of course, this does not replace the safeguarding arrangements that we already have in place. We would encourage all parents, to always volunteer information which may have an impact on their children's wellbeing with either myself, Mrs Stein or our FLO, Mrs McGibney and that any safeguarding concerns that parents might have about any child are reported swiftly.

## School Perimeter Fencing

In December the school applied to the DfE for a grant to update the perimeter fencing for the site. Unfortunately the bid wasn't successful and although we will appeal, it is unlikely that the project would go ahead in this calendar year. We only missed out on funding by a small margin meaning that the DfE doesn't consider our need to be urgent. However I do feel that the site would be enhanced by improved fencing and that this would add significantly to our existing security measures. If our appeal fails, we will resubmit a further bid in December.

## PESE Meeting for Year 5 Parents

Parents of children in Year 5 are invited to a meeting on Monday 13th May (at either 3.30 or 6.30 p.m) in which the process of registering their child for the PESE (11+ tests) will be explained. The meeting, led by Mrs Crowfoot, will also look at the process of considering a place at a grammar school for your child and the content of the PESE tests. After this meeting, parents will be provided with information of the consultation meetings which will take place on the 4th and 5th June in which they have the opportunity to meet with Year 5 and current Year 6 teachers in order to discuss recent test scores and how both these achievements and your child's attainment in everyday class work compares with that expected at a grammar school.

## Book Fair Thank You

Thank you to everyone who purchased a book from the Scholastic Book Fair last month helping our overall commission from book fairs this year reach £400. Our next Book Fair will be in the Autumn.

## Mobile Phones

The school does not allow children to keep mobile phones in their classrooms or school bags during the school day. We understand that some parents, of children in Year 5 and 6 who walk to school by themselves, like the reassurance of their child having a phone with them. In these circumstances, phones should be handed into the school office. Whilst every effort is taken to ensure these items are kept safe, items are left at the owners risk and the school takes no responsibility for any damage or loss that may occur.

## Medical Needs

Please can I remind parents to ensure that they update the school office if there is any change to their child's medical needs. The school is happy to support children by administering medications during the school day but can only do so with those (including creams and lotions) that have been provided on prescription by a medical provider. Please bear this in mind as we enter hayfever season.

Parents are responsible for ensuring that any long term medications kept in school (e.g. asthma inhalers or epi-pens) are in date.

With road works still taking place on the estate parents are reminded to ensure that they allow adequate time for their journey if they are driving to school. Please also ensure that children have all their belongings with them ready for the start of the day. Thank you.
