Message from the Chair of Governors: Steve King

Parent Governor Election

May I begin by thanking the nominees who put themselves forward for our Parent Governor vacancy and the parents who voted for them in the election. On behalf of the returning officer for the election, I have pleasure to report the outcome as follows:

Mr Rob Wellard 61% Mr Kwai Chi 39%

Having received the most votes Mr Rob Wellard is duly elected as a Parent Governor at Godinton Primary School.

Parent Governors play a vital role on the governing body. They hold the unique position of having a parental viewpoint of the school helped by building a rapport with the parental body that elects them. Furthermore, through their children, they have a first-hand experience of the delivery of the curriculum, and how the school is perceived from the 'consumers' point of view. This enables parent governors to bring a different perspective to the strategic management of the school, which is the key part of their role. Another important part of the role is being available to advise parents on appropriate routes of action but, they cannot become involved in individual concerns because no governor has the authority to act individually on behalf of the Governing Body or the school and their involvement may jeopardise appropriate complaints and appeals procedures.

Governor Training Day

At the beginning of June the eagerly awaited Governor Training Day arrived. It was a whole day event led by the school's Senior Leadership Team covering a wide range of topics. It was a fun packed and informative day which provided us all with a better insight to our school. The morning included sessions on Finance, Staffing Structure and Performance Management. The afternoon involved an update on the new Ofsted framework including consideration of the action needed to ensure we are ready for our next inspection. We particularly enjoyed a session on 'moderation' which is an important part of the process teacher assessment whereby comparison is made of various children's work to assessments made validate the by their teachers. We looked at some examples of writing to help us understand the process.

For me, the best session was one involving a group of children from different year groups. Pairs of Governors were put with a group of 4 children with the children leading discussion on aspects of our school. The children talked to us about the things they were most proud of in their books, questioned us about our understanding of what goes on in school and gave their views on things like house points, school values and learning adventures.
