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## Message from Miss Talbot

#### Dear Parents,

Last month the school enjoyed taking part in Ashford Vineyard's 1000 Hours of Kindness project. So many of our children chose to join in with the task of collecting kind deeds in their Kindness Passports which ranged from helping at home to joining in with community projects to help those less fortunate. All acts of Kindness however big or small contributed to our overall total of 1,880 hours of kindness-far surpassing our original intention of 1000 hours.

We are very fortunate at Godinton to have such a kind and caring school community, where for the vast majority of the time our children show generosity and thoughtfulness towards others. The project has however helped our children to appreciate how lucky most of us are and to consider those less fortunate beyond our own school community. The class penny collection challenge, as part of the Kindness Project, encouraged the children to bring in loose change to fill their class jar. As a school this venture raised over £400 for charities chosen by each class. Further details can be found further inside the newsletter. Before the end of the term, we will also be holding our termly STAR week. This term our PSHE focus is on 'Caring for our Community' and will see each year group completing a task that will benefit the local community. As our school, one of our core values focuses on the need to be kind, friendly and thoughtful. The activities which have taken place over the past few weeks clearly show that our children demonstrate this value in bucket loads.

On a very personal note, I would like to say a huge thank you to everyone for all their kind cards, messages and gifts as I headed off for my first chemotherapy session. I have been immensely touched by everyone's thoughtfulness. My first session went well, not nearly as bad as I imagined and although I know there is a long road ahead, I feel much better having started the journey. I will be popping into school as my health allows but will be keeping in touch with everything on a regular basis from the comfort of my sofa.

## Class News...

#### On the road to Canterbury

Year 6 children experienced life as medieval pilgrims earlier this month, as they embarked upon their own journey to the city of Canterbury (although, perhaps, in slightly more comfort than the travellers of the Middle Ages!). To mark the midway point of their topic of 'Journeys', the students visited Canterbury Cathedral and the Canterbury Tales, whilst taking in some of the historic architecture of the city, on their way to these attractions.

The children had an opportunity to discover how the area had changed since the Middle Ages by comparing maps of Canterbury today to those dating back over 800 years ago. Hidden in amongst the modern buildings along the main High Street in Canterbury are churches and hospitals, which would have been used by locals and pilgrims long ago, as they made the long and arduous journey to Canterbury Cathedral, where Archbishop Thomas Becket was murdered in 1170. Following the Archbishop's death, the Cathedral became one of Europe's most important pilgrimage centres, where miracles were said to have taken place.

Whilst inside the Cathedral, the children were encouraged to put their artistic talents to good use, by sketching interesting features of the building. The highly anticipated climb up the 'Pilgrims Steps' to the Trinity Chapel did not disappoint, with the children ascending the steps on their knees, as pilgrims would've traditionally done (much to the bemusement of other visitors in the Cathedral!).





The children's trip to Canterbury also included a visit to The Canterbury Tales Visitor Attraction, which recreates five stories written by Geoffrey Chaucer at the end of the 14<sup>th</sup> Century. Within the exhibition, five Canterbury-bound pilgrims are invited to take part in a story-telling competition, with the best raconteur receiving a free meal at the end of their pilgrimage. It is clear from the stories within the exhibition that the themes which entertained people in the Middle Ages, are still as amusing for people today!

School trips significantly enhance our children's learning experiences and as always we are immensely grateful to all the staff for their hard work in making these visits such a success.





#### **Cookery Workshop**

Thank you to all the Year 1 and 2 children and grown ups who joined in with our special autumn cookery day a few Saturdays ago. This event is an excellent opportunity for children to engage in real cooking experiences—using the school ovens and proper eauipment. The dishes created by our chefs were delicious—and included homemade bread, soup, roasted vegetables, auiche, and shortbread, Thank you to Mrs McGoldrick, Jo and Sam in our kitchen and all our staff who came along to help. We are planning a similar event in the spring.







A tunnel through a hill, the Folkestone White Horse, sea as far as the eye could see and white cliffs were just some of the amazing sights which greeted the children in Year 2 as they made their way to Dover Museum for their school trip last Friday morning.

The journey to Dover proved particularly exciting for the children in Butterflies and Ladybirds with these fascinating spectacles, not to mention the sight of Dover Castle itself, standing proudly above the town. All this enthusiasm, before the day had officially begun!

Year 2 have been studying homes around the world in their current topic of 'Who lives in a house like this?' So far, they have explored the traditional techniques used in the building of Masai Huts, as well as the construction of Chinese Stilt Houses, so-called as they are built on stilts of varying heights in order to protect against properties flooding in certain communities. In Dover Museum, the topic took on a historical slant, as the children were introduced to housing during the periods of the Bronze Age, Romans and The Stuarts. The children discovered how the Great Fire of London brought about significant improvements in the way that houses were constructed, especially in the materials that were used and the proximity of neighbours!

Dover Museum is also home to a Bronze Age boat, considered to be the world's oldest, known seagoing vessel. This wooden, prehistoric boat, discovered in Dover in September 1992, is thought to be some 3,000 years old. As well as seeing the actual boat and finding out some fascinating facts about its construction, the children were treated to an educational presentation which explained how the boat was discovered, excavated by archaeologists and preserved so that it may give some insight into how people from the Bronze Age lived their lives.

The visit to Dover Museum also included an artefact-handling session, where the children were introduced to some unusual historic objects, varying in date from the Roman era, through to the Victorians and into the 1960s. The children were given the task to decide what each artefact may have been used for – and their suggestions were very entertaining (it was suggested that a Victorian carpet beater may have been used to keep errant children in their places!). A certain adult within the party remembered some of these historical objects being used by an elderly relative during visits to their house, although this individual shall remain nameless!

Finally, the children's topic was brought back to the present with a practical art session, whereby the classes were invited to make a model of their home out of clay.

A great time was had by all. Many thanks to Mrs Walker and Miss Moss for organising such a busy day.

# Sports Hall Athletics Competition, Volleyball Competition, Dodgeball Competition



It's been a busy term competition wise, with teams entered into a variety of local competitions against other schools. As always our children did exceptionally well and demonstrated great team spirit. Congratulations to everyone who represented the school at these events.

#### Kent Junior Schools' Cross Country Competition

Last Saturday, Mrs Crowfoot and Mrs Ellis took 16 children from years 3-6 to the Kent Junior Schools' Cross Country Championships 2019 at Brands Hatch. This proved to be a challenging course, much harder than Detling where the competition had been held in previous years, and as always seems to be the case the weather was bracing. Years 3 and 4 had to run 1200m, whilst years 5 and 6 had to run 2200m – both courses ending on a particularly steep section, which was tough for all.

Whilst we haven't had the official times through yet, we did have some very good results on the day: Year 3 boys - Jack came 16th out of 144, Year 4 boys - Finley P came 3rd, Year 6 boys - Charlie came 14<sup>th</sup>, Year 6 girls - Lily-Rose came 11<sup>th</sup> meaning she will represent Kent at the national event next year.

All of the children put immense effort into their races and ran their hearts out - I know that everyone who came along to watch were extremely proud of the children and I certainly echo that. Well done everyone.
