When it comes to thinking of others at this time of year, our children have pulled out all the stops to help our community over the course of STAR Week this term.



Year 2 created hampers of goodies and made Christmas cards and Year 5 also made cards which they hand delivered to our neighbours at Loudon Court to very grateful thanks.

Years 1 and 4 focused their attention on children within the community less fortunate than themselves and gathered donations of unwanted toys for the Barnados charity. We know that these gifts will help brighten Christmas for others.



Year 3 decided to focus their attention on our



environment and having enlisted the help of the local council in providing litter pickers, completed a clear up of rubbish around the estate. They kept a record of the waste they collected which was weighed and the data tabulated. They now know

The Guiding Stars are about developing skills for life that will help the children in a range of academic and non academic tasks. They address the areas of: risk taking, motivation, self-confidence, problem solving, independence, perseverance, creative thinking, personal best, teamwork and communication. These are the areas which we think are most vital in ensuring that the children develop as well rounded individuals with a good bank of skills at their disposal to enable them to be successful and to achieve the best they can.

Next term, we will be sending home more information about our Guiding Stars and how parents can help to support these areas at home with their children. You will start to notice the Guiding Stars around the school and reference being made to them in your child's books.

We hope that this will prove to be a successful way of developing the children's confidence and their ability to try their best, with a positive outlook, at whatever they come up against.

Other Reminders...

Parking

As I have said on many occasions, we are very lucky to have such accessible parking for drop off and pick up so close to the school. We should be making full use of this but instead we still have problems with parents parking so close to the school that their actions are dangerous. I know how much our parents care about our children's wellbeing, so I am incredulous as to why some people would want to put children at risk.

Please do not park just outside the vehicular exit gate. We have observed parents parking here and walking their children through the 'out gate' straight into oncoming vehicles that are attempting to leave the site. This is not a safe place to park and a serious accident will occur if this carries on. We have already had a number of minor collisions between vehicles in this area.

At drop off and pick up, the school car park can only be used by blue badge holders. Please do not park in the school car park—use the car park by the village hall.

Please watch your speed when driving down Lockholt Close. Our extended school provision means that we have children leaving the site from 3.15 through to 5.50 and they deserve to be safe from reckless driving at all times.

Finally, please remember that the school site is non smoking (this includes vaping products) and that smoking or vaping whilst sitting in your car on the school site is not permissible.

I apologise for using the Christmas newsletter as the means by which to draw these matters to your attention but I know that the vast majority of parents will share my sentiments. If any of the above points strike a chord, please make it your new year's resolution to ensure that these practices are changed for the benefit of all.
