Reading

Challenge yourself to read at least once every day. Share some of your reading with an adult at home and answer their questions about the storyline, the characters and the author's word choice.

You could write a review of a book you have read, write an additional chapter for your favourite book or put together a character study. Alternatively, create a nonchronological report to summarise an information text you have enjoyed; this could be a book or an online article.

Writing

Write an adventure story based on Charles Darwin's Beagle voyage. Create some fictional characters and ensure that the description of their actions and the dialogue you include, reflects their personalities. Remember to use all of our Year 6 grammar (sentence variety, expanded descriptions and sophisticated vocabulary) and punctuation, as well as remembering the rules of dialogue.

There are also three grammar tasks on Purple Mash for you to complete (go to 2Do) and specific grammar tests on spag.com.

Keep practising your spellings as well.

Maths

Mathletics tasks have been assigned: starting on Monday 23rd March there is a week of perimeter, area and volume task, followed by a week of ratio tasks on Monday 30th March.

Some of the skills we will not have covered in class to date. Please use the Mathletics online support tools and videos to help you understand the concepts.

If you achieve less than 70% on one task, please tackle it again so that you are more confident with the skill.

Science Skills

Design an experiment to test the affect of friction on an object. Think about what objects and materials you could test, which variables you would change and how you would measure the results. What would you record? If you want to, you could actually complete the experiment and share your results and draw a conclusion. There are also two forces activities to complete on Purple Mash.

Creative Adventure

Produce a piece of artwork, write a song or create a piece of music inspired by the theme 'the rainforest'. This could be a pencil drawing, a painting, a collage or a sculpture.

Design a container that an explorer such as Charles Darwin would have used when collecting plant and animal specimens in South America. Think about what compartments it might have, how it would close and what material it would be constructed from. Draw a diagram with annotated labels to show the features.
