Understanding the text

Before trying to answer questions on a text, we need to make sure we understand what the text is about.

Are there any words you unsure about?

Could you use the words or sentences around any unfamiliar words to suggest what they might mean?

If you're still not sure, where else could you look to help you?

Inferring meaning from the text

Remember, 'inferring' means being a little bit like a detective to use clues from the text to support what you think is happening or why it is happening.

Understanding the vocabulary (see opposite) will help you to do this.
