Maths

Over the next few weeks we are going to be looking at adding and subtracting decimal numbers. Remember to look at the guidance pages to help. For this Trail, we have created an Adding and Subtracting Decimals Guidance Page and a Multiplying and Dividing Decimals Page. You can always go back and look at the previous Decimal Guide too. Why don't you try this game with someone at home?

You will need a partner and a six-sided dice for this game.



Take it in turns rolling the dice twice and placing the digits in the blank spaces above. Record the number in a table.

Swap over with your partner.

Roll the dice again and add your new number to the first number. The winner is the person who after adding 4 numbers is the closest to 1.5 **without** going over.
