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Message from Miss Talbot

Dear Parents,

As you will be aware, for the last two years, we have submitted bids for funding assistance to the DfE to improve the auality of our perimeter fencing and school entry and exit points. We heard yesterday that at last, our bid has been successful and that our funding for the project has been granted. This is really brilliant news that will help to improve the security of the site and the safety of everyone.

The project looks at the entirety of perimeter security and will see higher metal fencing installed. This will provide a secure boundary but will be aesthetically pleasing as well. It will also include new gates at entry points for both pedestrians and vehicles, meaning that during the school day, permission will be required to enter the site.

I can't yet give you a timeline for when the work is likely to be completed as the current situation is obviously causing some delays in the undertaking of new projects but I will keep you updated.

We are also in the process of putting together a further funding bid to the DfE for repair work to the school roof covering the older part of the building dating from 1978. We hope that this bid will be submitted in the summer and that a successful outcome will be obtained in the autumn. As an academy the bid process is the way in which schools are able to secure additional funding that maintained schools can obtain from the Local Authority.

We are very fortunate to have a very well maintained building and these improvements will help to preserve its longevity.


