What have we all been up to?

Class News

The children have settled back into routines auickly and have re-engaged with the curriculum well. Maths and English skills continue to be a priority in order to ensure that we bolster the areas hit hardest by periods of school closure. Assessments are taking place so the teaching teams are very clear on the direction that learning needs to take in terms 5 and 6. However we want to balance this with providing an enjoyable, broad curriculum which enthuses the children. Have a look at some of the exciting things that have been taking place since we came back to school...

Year 5

It was lovely to welcome Year 5 back to their classrooms this term and we have been amazed at how well they have settled in. The children in both classes got stuck straight into their science learning and have planted sunflowers, nigella and cornflowers. We have already had some signs of the seeds germinating and shoots starting to appear! Our new blooms have inspired our Creative Adventure work and the children have been planning how they will create a William Morris inspired print to showcase the flowers that will soon be lining our classrooms. The children have shown fantastic resilience as they have adjusted back to our school routines



Year 3

We have loved having Year 3 all back together. This term we are exploring the book 'James and the Giant Peach' in Guided reading; we have also been using it to enhance our understanding of play scripts.

We have started a new topic in Learning Adventure and are looking at Electricity. We have looked at static electricity and showed this by rubbing a balloon on someone's hair and have been starting to make our own circuits to investigate the flow of electricity. It's been great fun!

Year 4

Since our return to school, Year 4 have been using our powers of persuasion to debate whether humans should continue to eat meat. We have practiced the art of presumption and flattery to persuade the opposers or proposers to agree with our point. Within DT we carried out consumer surveys gathering both qualitative and quantitative data in preparation for our take away delivery service.

The most exciting news is that we've also been

incubating chicken eggs. We have a selection of light Sussex, barred Plymouth rocks and cream legged barred - 12 eggs in all. We hope they start to hatch soon.



Year 1



In Year 1 we have been popping on our eyepatches, grabbing our telescopes and immersing ourselves in pirate adventures with our

new topic 'We arrgghhhh pirates'.

The children had to save the day on their return to school when we discovered that an evil pirate had stolen Year 1's treasure from our treasure chest. Thankfully they worked together in teams to find and collect 20 coins each and recovered all 100 gold coins in record time. We have been delving into some fantastic pirate stories, identifying powerful adjectives and thinking about verbs in their past and present forms.

The children have been using their maths skills to investigate their numbers to 50 and solve pirate puzzles. We have also used our science skills to think about how materials are made and sort them into groups by their properties. The beebots have helped us to practice our coding skills and we've been creating our own pirates in Art and DT along with our very own treasure!

to be a good friend, talking about different feelings emotions and who we can talk to if we need to.



Year 2

We have enjoyed settling back into school and spending time with our friends. Our house point charts are full to bursting because of all of the great learning we have been doing! For our first Creative lesson we absolutely loved making Mother's Day cards to take home and give to our Mums. In Learning Adventure, we have been exploring poetry and have begun to write our own shape poems to go with our Great Fire of London theme. Ladybird class are also eagerly observing the growth of the ladybird larvae and watching them move around their little home!

Year 6

Year 6's return to school has been a thrilling experience — literally. During the past two weeks, the children have been working hard on creating their own suspense stories. To facilitate their understanding of the genre, they have studied the techniques of suspense writing to use within their own narratives, such as short sentences to build up tension, similes, metaphors and ellipsis to create those 'what happens next' moments. The stories that they have woven have had the adults on the edge of their seats.

From thrilling tales to ship sails, Year 6 have also spent time researching the HMS Beagle, the vessel on which Charles Darwin served as a naturalist to sail to South America and develop his theory of evolution. Now that the children are familiar with the ship's components, they are looking forward to making models of the vessel in the coming weeks.

Housepoints

Parking

You may have noticed that our local PCSO has been on the estate in the past week reminding drivers to show consideration for the safety of our children and to park at Chimney's car park. PCSO Stevens will continue to make regular patrols so I would ask that to avoid the embarrassment of being asked to move your vehicle, you avoid parking inconsiderately in Lockholt Close or the surrounding roads.

Following some enquiries, we have been advised by the KCC Safer Mobility Officer that a survey will be completed after the Easter break to assess whether the council can reinstate the Road Crossing Patrol in Springwood Drive which was removed in 2016. I would encourage parents to contact KCC with any concerns about traffic in Springwood Drive or at the top of Lockholt Close in order to highlight the dangers that traffic is presenting.

Covid Cleaning

With stringent cleaning still required due to the pandemic, we have continued with our additional cleaning measures, ensuring that all steps are being taken to keep our children safe. Over the half term break, a full deep clean of the



site took place and before we reopened on the 8th March, we enlisted the services Covid' 'Complete who carried out cleaning process involving a combination of UV-C light technology and ozone diffusion which 99.9% of germs and pathogens, including Coronavirus, across all surfaces. It is a safe process which is used in other schools, dentists, surgeries, supermarkets, restaurants and bars. A further deep clean of the site is planned for Easter.

New Starters- 2021

It hardly seems possible that we are once again starting to think about those children who will be joining us in September. Those of you looking at a school place for your child in September 2021, will be notified by KCC as to the outcome of your application on Friday 16th April. We will contact those parents who are successful in gaining a place with us, after the Easter holiday. At the moment, I am unsure of the transition arrangements that we will be able to make due to the Covid restrictions. However we will do everything we can to familiarise your child with life at Godinton before they start.

For those of you looking at a potential school place in 2022 or beyond, please remember that in the event of a school having more parents applications, than places available, the school's oversubscription criteria will be used to determine offers. Like most schools, and in line with KCC policy, our Admissions policy states that a sibling link will be broken if a family move more than 2 miles away from the school since the admission of their last child.
