## Message from Miss Talbot Outdoor Classroom Week

Last week we took learning outside for all the children as part of our engagement with National Outdoor Classroom Day. This is a global initiative to make outdoor learning an integral part of school curriculums. All the classes had opportunities to take their learning out into the woodland, our wildlife garden or out onto the school field. Woodland sessions were set up by our Forest School lead, Miss Attenborough which saw Year R making Jubilee crowns and having a woodland tea party, Year 1 making spring collages, Year 2 building towers out of natural materials, Year 3 exploring Roman dyes, Year 4 building dens, Year 5 ship building and Year 6 investigating trees. Alongside the lessons in the woods, the children also used our site to enhance aspects of their Maths, English and Science lessons.

An added bonus was that we had been placed in one of the VIP boxes which our children richly deserved.

Our school choir will start up again in September and we will be looking for participants to take part in next year's Young Voices event which will take place in January.



## Class News Year 6–Day Trip to

Chessington

Last week, Year 6 swapped their pen-stained fingers for white knuckles as they spent the day at Chessington World of Adventures. Year 6 is always a busy year with hard work, high expectations, the recent SATs tests and preparing for the transition to secondary school to name but a few, so the children definitely deserved this treat.





It was an early start for the girls and boys in Eagles and Falcons classes, as they departed for their exciting day at 8am on Thursday morning. Fortunately for them, they left the grey clouds and rain behind in Kent and were greeted by warm and sunny weather in Surrey.

The day itself was a high-thrill, jam-packed experience with rides, shops, food, games and arcades. The children had an opportunity to sample as much of the park as they wished. Whether that was flying through the treetops on the Vampire ride, gently floating down the stream on the Gruffalo attraction or searching for animals on an African Zoofari, all thrillseeking tastes were catered for — and with short queues to boot!

The children had an amazing day, and all agreed that they would happily swap their Learning Adventure lessons for Chessington World of Adventures again. A big thank you to all the adults that joined Year 6 on the day.

## Year 2–Busy in the Kitchen

Year 2 have had a busy start to their new topic, Turrets and Tall Tales.

The children have been reading the traditional tale of Jack and the beanstalk and in Learning Adventure have written their own alternative version. Alongside this, in Geography the children have been learning about land use and farming in Kent. They know about the different types of farms and what is grown or reared on them. Year 2 grew their own broad beans and in DT they have been learning about healthy foods, leading to designing and preparing their own fruit salad. The children also worked with the Independent Catering staff, having a tour of the school kitchen, the eauipment and even helping to prepare the daily salad cart and vegetables for school lunches.



## Cycling-Year 6

This week, many of our Yr 6 students have participated in Cycle Confidence sessions run by the Cycle Circle Team. The sessions help build cycling skills and confidence which are very important as we know that some of our pupils will be cycling to secondary school next year. During the sessions, the children have cycled many miles, venturing as far as Ashford International Station, The Designer Outlet, Victoria Park and the Stour Centre. The children were amazed as to how far they could cycle and the places they could cycle safely to, using mainly cycle paths and local roads. The Cycle Confidence sessions are the final event in our cycling calendar. We look forward to Autumn Term where cycle ready sessions will be offered to Years R and 1 and Bikeability training for Years 4, 5 and 6.

## Athlete Visit



The children were put through their paces yesterday morning when title-holding, kickboxing athlete, Jessica Fleischer (not to be confused with 80's television novelist-cum-detective, played by Angela Landsbury!) paid a visit to the school. Jess had come to Godinton as part of the Sports for Schools initiative, a national scheme designed to both raise money for schools to improve their physical activity provision, as well as support athletes and para-athletes through their training.

Each child, and even some of the adults, participated in a series of four 1-minute drills. Beginning with 'Spotty Dogs' (jumping with alternate arms and legs), the children progressed onto 'Mountain climber', press-ups or souats and finally star jumps. By the end, there were lots of red-faces, sweaty brows, audible panting but big smiles.

The morning's visit concluded with an inspiring assembly and Question and Answer session, during which Jess spoke to the children about her journey as a title-winning athlete, and the ups and downs she experienced along the way. Some children were invited to share their aspirations with the school, whilst others had the opportunity to try out some kickboxing moves, under Jess' guidance. The children were left with the message that, for any goal in life, it's important to 'dream big, start small and to never give up'.

A couple of weeks ago, the children brought home their sponsorship forms for this event. ## Design Technology



Year 4 have been learning about cams and cam mechanisms in the Design Technology element of this term's Creative Adventure. The children explored how a dowel and follower work together to turn a cam to create a moving

part and investigated how different shaped cams affected movement. They then designed their own simple toy with a moving part. The activity was a great lesson in adaptability and perseverance as the children had to re-engineer several times before deciding on the best prototype. They learnt how to use hacksaws, glue guns and hand drills correctly and safely to make our models. This topic has also helped to reinforce the importance of Godinton's Guiding Stars; helping each other and collaborating, being independent and sharing equipment.
