

Our Guiding Stars Curriculum Reading, Writing and Phonics: The Leading Light Subjects for 'Communication'

EYFS	We can use our phonic skills to segment and blend so that we can decode words, as well as recalling key events from a story.
	We can write simple phrases and sentences that can be read by others, using recognisable letters.
	We are beginning to express our ideas and feelings and can listen and respond to the thoughts of others.
Year 1	We continue to apply our phonic knowledge and skills, checking that the text makes sense as we read as well as answering key questions on the text.
	We can use simple conjunctions in our sentences, beginning to use capital letters and full stops and starting to use key features of some genres.
	We know that different people have different ideas and we are beginning to be able to listen and respond to these.
Year 2	We read aloud with increasing fluency, using phonic skill if required, making inferences on the basis of what is said and done while referring to the text.
	We can develop our writing by starting to use different types of adverbials and adjectives to add detail, as well as using accurate sentence punctuation.
	We are beginning to listen to others carefully, taking it in turns to speak and express opinions on a variety of subjects.
Year 3	We discuss the different themes of fiction and non-fiction texts, make sensible predictions and work out the meaning of unfamiliar words by using the
	context.
	We are extending our writing by using realistic dialogue, complex sentences and expanded noun phrases, as well as carefully chosen vocabulary for effect.
	We can develop and agree on rules for effective discussion, listening politely, asking questions and making suggestions.
Year 4	We identify, discuss and compare themes, across more than one text, discussing inferences and justifying with evidence from the text.
	We can use variations to our sentence structure in our writing, including relative clauses and fronted adverbials, using commas where appropriate.
	We participate in discussion, providing opinions, making relevant comments and building on the ideas of others.
Year 5	We read different genres, using clues from the text to make plausible predictions and identifying how language structure can contribute to meaning.
	We use different methods to create cohesion in our writing, describing characters and settings with increasing detail and using a range of punctuation.
	We can express our opinions and preferences, giving reasons and explaining to others with increasing fluency,
Year 6	We can read and analyse different text types, exploring the author's use of language and discussing unfamiliar vocabulary.
	We write fluently and neatly across the range of genres, using a variety of punctuation and increasing complex sentence structures to convey our meaning.
	We discuss our thoughts and ideas, explaining clearly while using appropriate formal or informal language.
