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## Message from Miss Talbot

## Journey to the past

As we head into sunnier weather, we see our children enjoying a wide range of off site visits to enhance areas of the curriculum.

At the start of this week, dressed as evacuees, Year 4 ventured off to Tenterden railway station for an amazing World War 2 experience day. With railway staff in costume and character, the children learnt about rationing, the black market, bombing raids and the RAF. The children were then transported back to 1939 to imagine what it would have been like to be evacuated, leaving family behind for a journey into the unknown. One of the Tenterden steam trains took them deep into the countryside and when they reached their final destination, the children gained a glimpse of what it would have been like to be picked by unfamiliar families to live with them as the war continued. Passengers on the train included people who had themselves been evacuated, for real, as children and they had the opportunity to share their stories with us.

It is hard to imagine how difficult it would have been for all those who lived through the events of the Second World War. However by engaging with this experience, our children came a little closer to realising the experience faced by thousands of children 85 years ago.







# Year 2—At the top of the Beanstalk

Imagine the excitement of discovering that – a mysterious parcel had been left in Butterflies and Ladybirds classroom– a letter from a Giant and a package of unidentified beans.

The children planted the beans in plastic pockets which they stuck to the windows and eagerly watched them spring to life, identifying the roots, shoots and leaves as they flourished in the sunlight. Having now germinated, the children have planted the beans outside and are keenly waiting to see if they will grow up to the sky and reach the clouds.

With beanstalks on their minds, the children enjoyed exploring the story of 'Jack and the Beanstalk' and have written some fantastic alternative versions of their own with all sorts of things found at the top of their beanstalks.





# Year 3— What did the Romans do for us?

Year 3 began this term, taking on the role of detectives, looking for clues about the past found in ancient artefacts. The children explored a range of objects and tried to work out what these told us about the past; thinking about what the objects were, who would have used them and which period in history they could have been from. Their exploration and questioning led them to Roman Britain and the start of an exciting new topic.

Since then, Dragonflies and Bumblebees have enjoyed discovering all about Celtic history, the Roman invasion of Britain in AD43 and Boudicca's fearsome battle. They have made Roman sandals and mosaics as part of their Creative Adventure work and will be telling us more about our their topics in their class assemblies this week.

#### Year 5- Matter of Fact

This term year 5 have been investigating states of matter and how different materials can change from one thing to another. The children built on their prior knowledge of solids, liquids and gasses by exploring the effect of dissolving, evaporating and separating and whether the changes that resulted were reversible or irreversible.



This unit of work involved a number of practical experiments in which the children discovered what the variables within the experiments were, and then learnt how changing the independent variable can create different outcomes within the experiment, whilst also learning how to observe or measure the dependent variable. Complicated scientific stuff! The results the children obtained and the observations made, helped them to understand why irreversible changes could not be changed back into their original parts.

### Year 6—Surviving SATs

Surviving SATs...and that's just the staff!

The children in Year 6 have worked their socks off this year. From co-ordinates to conjunctions and tenses to percentages, the students have covered countless areas of study in their daily Maths, Guided Reading and GPS lessons. They have completed enough practice tests to fell a small forest, and their brains are bursting with facts that are likely to flummox even some adults of a certain age!

Last week saw the culmination of all their hard work from over the past four years through the sitting of SATs (standardised assessment tests). These are tests which measure the educational progress of children between Years 2 and 6. They take place in schools across the country in May, and there are strict guidelines to follow for administering them. For some children, taking their SATs can be a daunting experience, despite reassurances from the staff that they should simply try their best.

Happily, this is exactly what the students in Eagles and Falcons did. They coped superbly with their 4-day testing schedule, demonstrating resilience. maturity and throughout the toughest of questions. Their sensible attitude towards the assessments was one of the contributing factors in allowing the week to run so smoothly. huge thank you to everyone involved in making the week a success - to parents, for ensuring that the children arrived to school on time, well-rested and in a calm state. and to staff across the school for all their efforts in supporting and invigilating the tests. It really was a team venture.

Now that the SATs are over, the children in Year 6 have a great deal of exciting events to look forward to for the rest of the year. There's Activity Week, our annual trip to Chessington, the residential for some children and the highly-anticipated Leavers' Production, to name but a few. It's safe to say that all these treats are very well-deserved. Many congratulations, Year 6 — you did us proud!
