### Staff News

### **Attendance Matters**

In August, new national regulations regarding penalty notices for unauthorised absence from school come into force. The first time a penalty notice is issued for unauthorised term time holiday, or other unauthorised absence of 10 sessions (5 days) in a rolling period of 10 school weeks, the penalty will be £160 to be paid within 28 days, reduced to £80 if paid within 21 days.

If a second penalty notice is issued to the same parent in respect of the same pupil, the parent must pay £160 if paid within 28 days. There is no reduction for early payment.

A third period of unauthorised absence could then result in prosecution.

The above measures include absence during term time taken for the purpose of holiday.

All children must be in school by 8.50 a.m. Any arrival after 9.15 that has not been authorised, will be recorded as an unauthorised absence and will contribute to rolling periods of unauthorised absence which could result in a penalty notice as outlined above.

More information can be found in our updated attendance leaflet and policy which will be sent out to parents at the start of the new academic year.

Good attendance at school is essential and the expectation is that children achieve attendance as close to 100% as possible. We know that 100% attendance isn't always possible as colds and tummy upsets are just part of life. However some absence is preventable and we would encourage all parents to bear the following in mind:

Absences below 90% are a serious concern and may result in further measures being taken, including referral to the school liaison officer for attendance.
