## Sustainable Transport

Congratulations to all those children who have joined in with our WOW challenge by walking, cycling, scootering or parking and striding to school. An average of 275 children have achieved their first two badges which is brilliant. Don't forget that the challenge resets each month and all the children have to do is use a sustainable method of travel to school at least once a week. We will shortly be checking the database so that November badges can be distributed to the children.

In order to aid our efforts to ease traffic congestion around the Godinton Park estate and surrounding road, we have been working with KCC to put a school travel plan in place. A travel plan identifies local issues relating to the school journey, sets out a strategy of agreed aims and identifies a package of measures designed to promote more sustainable travel choices for pupils, parents, staff and visitors to our school. ### **Class News**

### Year 1 go back in time



We were very excited to be able to offer the children in Year 1 the opportunity to bring their learning to life with an interactive visit from the team at Maidstone Museum.

The children have been learning about Victorian childhoods and toys and games from the past. They were thrilled to be able to see, and play with, artefacts and replicas from the Victorian era to have a go at some popular, and tricky games that they hadn't tried before.

The children explored toys from the past such as: hoops and sticks, knuckle bones and spinning tops, and also learned about toys that were used in Victorian times and are still popular today, such as teddies, dolls and yoyos.

Finally the children enjoyed a special craft activity; a chance to make their own historical inspired peg doll just like the ones that children would have played with in the 1900s.



# Year 6 Explore Canterbury

It may not surprise you to hear that school trips require a lot of organisation — countless phone calls, itineraries to plan and reams of paperwork to fill in. So when the children in Year 6 were left in charge to organise their own visit to Canterbury earlier this month, the adults were delighted! Prior to their trip, the children worked in groups to plan their fieldwork studies in the city, looking at transport links, tourism and historical landmarks and buildings within the High Street.

Before the half term, the classes had been studying the medieval period, focusing upon Canterbury's expansion from a small medieval market town to a thriving city. The children also learnt about the murder of Archbishop Thomas Becket and the pilgrimages that people would make to Canterbury, following his death. Such pilgrims inspired Geoffrey Chaucer to compose 'The Canterbury Tales'.



The day itself comprised of three parts: a guided tour of Canterbury Cathedral, a craft-based workshop and the geographical fieldwork that the children had planned the day before. The latter gave the adults and

children alike the opportunity to study interesting features of the city, which might normally be missed on a day out in Canterbury. Sadly the weather wasn't on the children's side, but this didn't stop them enjoying the day.

The children represented the school brilliantly, and received many compliments from staff at the Cathedral for their behaviour. By the end of the day, the group had recorded a count of approx. 12,000 to 13,000 steps, but were grateful that, unlike medieval pilgrims, there was a dry Ashfordbound train waiting at the station to take them home.

It has been a pleasure for me to accompany our Year 3 children to their swimming lessons at Ashford School over the past 8 weeks. Working in small groups, with their own instructors, the children have had an intensive course of swimming instruction by aualified swimming teachers. All the children have made great progress with their swimming skills over the course of the sessions, with our confident swimmers perfecting stroke action, speed and accuracy and our less confident children now able to use floats and noodles to support them in the water. Swimming forms a core part of our Year 3 PE Similar sessions will run next curriculum. year, when our current Year 2 children move into Year 3.
