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Message from Miss Talbot Young Voices

A three hour rehearsal alongside all the other schools involved, put our children in fine voice ready for an outstanding performance to a packed audience. Year 2- What's that

Smell?

Year 5

Learn about the U.S.A

Year 5's Sensational Start to our topic, 'Stars and Stripes' meant a hop across the pond to America. Teams went head-tohead to battle for raffle tickets, answering auestions about America's vast diversity, iconic personalities and incredible geography. Who could recognise the towering Washington Monument or the breath-taking views of the Grand Canyon?



Our auiz starts our journey to North America as we discover the fascinating history of the USA including many significant people that contributed to its success, and its incredible landmarks that make America a truly special place.

Year 4-Dig Deep!

Year 4 kicked off their History adventure by becoming archaeologists to solve the mystery of Godinton Hoo! Examining fascinating artefacts unearthed by Mr. Rowson, the children used their detective skills to conclude the items belonged to a poor Anglo-Saxon male.

The excitement didn't stop there-after leaving the site, they fired up their imaginations, asking ouestions to dig even deeper into Anglo-Saxon life. What will they uncover next?

Year 3

Start their new topic with a bang!

Year three have enjoyed an explosive start to the term with an introduction to our new topic 'Our Wild World'. The children were challenged to see if they could fit a solid, a liquid and a gas into a plastic bottle. They then observed the reaction as the solid (mentos) reacted with the liquid (coca cola) and created a huge explosion. There were many excited faces as the liquid fizzed up and gushed out of the container.

The children have also explored the process of evaporation and conducted fair test experiments to explore how heat can affect the process. This has linked to their learning about the water cycle as well as extreme types of weather such as monsoons and droughts.

In DT, Year 3 have been learning all about Windmills and how they use wind to create their own power to produce electricity or grind grain. Exploring а variety of construction toys, the children have successfully created their own structures focusing on constructing strong and sturdy bases which will support the sails of a windmill in extreme wind! They are excited to use this knowledge to design and create their own working windmills as the term progresses.

Year 6–

The Caribbean awaits

Are you tired of waking up to cold, dark mornings? Fed up of scraping the ice off your car windscreen at the start of each day? Does your mind drift to sunnier climes? Fortunately, Year 6's topic for terms 3 and 4, 'Paradise Found', centres on the Caribbean islands, and provides a bit of tropical sunshine and warmth to these dark and chilly, wintry days.

At the beginning of term, a Caribbeantreasure hunt provided inspired the students with a fun introduction to the topic. The classes' newly-acquired orienteering skills from PE were put to the test, as they searched for clues around the school building. These clues gave the children a hint of what they could look forward to finding out about in the coming weeks. So far, Eagles and Falcons have studied the human and physical geography of this Central American archipelago. They have also looked at cultural elements such as the significance of carnival and are in the process of designing their own carnival masks, to be made and then worn at a special event later in term 4. This term's topic also offers many opportunities for the children to practise their extended writing skills, through suspenseful adventure stories, persuasive webpages and letter writing and finally an informative biography.

A very exciting tropical topic on the Caribbean awaits Year 6 in terms 3 and 4, which is sure to 'carry-on-being' enthralling throughout the weeks!

Year R-Get Chilly!





Whilst Year 6 have been exploring warm, sunny locations, Reception have had a chilly start to their new topic "It's Cold Outside." Brrrrrrrr! Everything keeps freezing! The children have explored magical spheres of ice, of all different colours with different things hiding inside. They have also looked at the different shapes in the ice, how the ice felt and observed how it changed as it melted.



Whilst we wait for the weather to warm up, it looks like Reception are enjoying everything the chilly weather has to offer.

Year 1– Take a Voyage of Discovery





Year 6 Team Building



The old adage says, 'there no I in team' and a group of Year 6s proved this to be true when they attended a team building day in Herne Bay before the Christmas holiday. The day itself was designed to support the children in their preparation for transition to secondary school in September. It gave them the opportunity to work with a selection of secondary school-aged students from a number of other Kent-based schools through many different team building activities. And this was no easy task! Members of the groups, with a range of ages, were expected to pull together despite never having met to complete some very challenging tasks. Although there was no time limit for each task, the rules were harsh, and if competitors broke the rules in any way, they were required to start again. There was a range of activities on offer, from ski-walking to bouncing balls on parachutes – enough to make the creators of the Crystal Maze envious! Despite the cold and windy weather conditions, the Year 6s did a fantastic job at getting into the sportsmanship spirit. They worked together to attempt the activities, showing great perseverance to get them done, as well as resilience, when things did not quite qo according to plan. They demonstrated skills such as compromise and collaboration. Critical thinking allowed them to consider how they would tackle a task and communication helped them to explain their logic to their team mates. The children represented the school brilliantly and a great day out was had by all.

Roof Update

Over the past year, we have been in with discussions the Department for Education in order to access funding for the roof over the school hall to be replaced. The roof is constructed from RAAC (reinforced aerated autoclaved concrete), the building material which has been high profile in the media in recent months due to limits in its effectiveness. Back in 2021, we had the same substance removed from the roof covering our Year R and Year 1 classrooms and whilst work to replace the roof was completed, these two year groups operated out of temporary classrooms on the school field.

Funding for the final stage of roof replacement at Godinton has now been approved and work to replace the roof covering the hall and part of the kitchen will begin over half term. A temporary modular hall space will be erected on the school field and will be used for lunch, assemblies, breakfast club, events, clubs and PE whilst the roof work is carried out. We will also have a temporary kitchen facility in place. It is anticipated that work will be completed by the end of the summer.

Whilst the work is likely to cause some disruptions, I do not envisage it being significantly disruptive to the day to day operation of the school. I will keep everyone updated on how work is progressing but don't be surprised if you start to see activity on site after the break.
