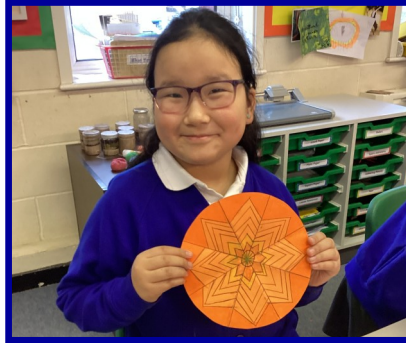


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### Message from Miss Talbot

## A Celebration Of Colour

January this year has been a particularly grey and gloomy month, so it was lovely to inject some much needed colour into the school on our Art Day last week. Taking the theme of colour, and everything from monochrome to rainbows, the children approached the day with creativity and heaps of enthusiasm.

Throughout the day, each child created their own coloured circle, working carefully in a single colour and exploring how many different shades, tones, and patterns could be made within that one hue. From swirling blues to fiery reds and glowing yellows, every circle became a unique mini-masterpiece. The children experimented with lines, dots, spirals, and repeating patterns in a wide range of media including pastels and paints discovering how expressive a single colour can be when used imaginatively. In addition to their circle artwork, the children explored colour in the wider world of art. Year 6 studied the bold, geometric compositions of Piet Mondrian whilst Year 2 took on the challenge of monochrome doodles, producing striking black-and-white designs in the style of Mr Doodle.

One of the highlights still to come will be the unveiling of our corridor installation, created by joining every child's circle into one large collaborative artwork. Once assembled, the piece will form a colourful pathway through the hall corridor—a fantastic celebration of what we can achieve when we create together.



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## An Unforgettable Night at the O2 Arena



Earlier this month, 55 of our talented singers from Years 4, 5 and 6 took part in the Young Voices concert at the O2 Arena in London—an extraordinary experience which I am sure they will remember for years to come.

Joining more than 8,000 children from across the South East, our children became part of one of the largest school choirs in the world. The atmosphere inside the arena was electric, with a packed audience cheering on thousands of young performers who had worked so hard to prepare for this moment.

The Young Voices choir performed a wonderful selection of songs, including a lively pop medley, a rousing sea shanty medley, favourites from the musical *Wicked*, and of course the iconic Young Voices anthem, “The Power in Me.” This unforgettable performance was the result of months of dedication. The children began rehearsing last July, showing real commitment as they learned lyrics, mastered harmonies, and built confidence together.

A huge thank you goes to Mrs Stein and Mrs Fagg for their endless efforts with rehearsals, the staff and parents who supported the trip, the families who came to cheer from the audience, and—most importantly—our wonderful children, who sang their hearts out and represented our school brilliantly.

Young Voices is more than a concert; it’s an experience that inspires teamwork, resilience and a lifelong love of music. We’re thrilled our children had the opportunity to be part of something so special.

## Clear as ‘MUD’ – Managing Uncertainty Daily.

It is always a pleasure to be able to work with Godinton parents in different capacities, and especially through their involvement in the workshops we have had on offer this year. This term, Mrs Stein and Mrs McGibney have been delivering MUD (Managing Uncertainty Daily) workshops to a group of 18 parents taking part in this 6 week programme. This piloted course had a delayed start due to burst pipes, but I’m sure the parents who are involved would say that it’s been really useful in helping them to understand some of the challenges beneath anxious behaviours seen in their children, whether it’s attachment and separation or school based anxiety, and how when it’s linked to ASD traits or neuro diversity this can create more difficulties within their child at school and at home.

Together through lived experiences and shared expertise, the group is learning more about parenting styles, what contributes to anxious behaviour, and strategies to support their children—recognising that there is a fine line between seeking to rescue them or avoiding situations and giving them the skills for success. By the end of the 6-week course we hope parents will have lots of tools and tips to manage change and daily difficulties in a more confident manner.

Hopefully we will host another ‘MUD’ course later in the year for those who missed out on this one.

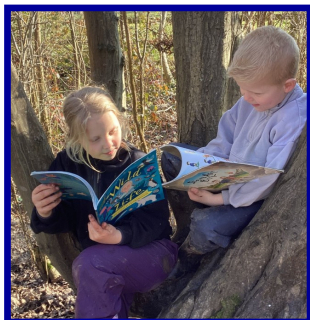


## Lunchtime Staff Update

One of our new initiatives will be our termly 'Book Buzz' sessions, where children can share books they enjoy with their classmates. ## Burst Pipe Update

I had hoped that we would be further on with the arrangements to get all classrooms functional again after the pipe leaks we returned to at the start of term, but unfortunately our recovery plan is moving slowly. This is mainly due to the fact that the three most affected classrooms still require drying out. Dehumidifiers and additional drying measures have been actioned but we can't start the process of returning these classrooms to use until humidity levels return to normal limits.

This means that for the rest of this term and probably for part of next term, we will need to continue to use temporary classroom spaces: the after school mobile, the computing room and the school hall. Upper school classes are taking turns in using the hall so that all classes have the opportunity to have some ordinary classroom provision and this is working as well as it can, with children and staff demonstrating great patience and resilience. This arrangement has however compromised the use of the hall for PE lessons. We are trying to make use of our outside space for PE sessions as best we can but have been up against so much wet weather, this is proving challenging. With a class continuing to be based in the computing room we have been unable to fully deliver our computing curriculum.

These arrangements are far from ideal and are immensely frustrating. We are doing all we can to move the process along as swiftly as we can and I will continue to keep you updated as and when I know a little more.



## Other News and Reminders...

- If anyone has any items of school uniform that their child has outgrown, these can be donated to our pre-loved uniform cupboard in the entrance foyer. This cupboard contains a variety of uniform items which are free for parents to help themselves to.
- To help some of our families we will also be having a toiletry item drive the week after half term.
